A successful Foreign Service Specialist candidate will demonstrate the <u>dimensions</u> essential to the work of the Foreign Service, including composure, cultural adaptability, judgment, and written communication skills.





Consular Fellows Program:

Consular Fellows have a unique opportunity to utilize their foreign language skills to provide critical consular services overseas. Duties and responsibilities are similar to those of entry-level career Foreign Service Officers. While at post, Consular Fellows are members of the embassy or consulate community and receive many of the same benefits that career Foreign Service members receive, such as housing and educational allowances for eligible family members, among other benefits. The critical languages include: Mandarin Chinese, Spanish, Portuguese, and Arabic.

Foreign Service Officers

There are five Foreign Service Officer career tracks: Consular, Economic, Management, Political, and Public Diplomacy. To become a Foreign Service Officer, you must first register for and take the Foreign Service Officer Test (FSOT). It is a general knowledge test that covers subjects such as U.S. history, government, world geography, English, basic math, basic IT, and U.S. culture. *** Veterans Preference points (if applicable) will be added at the end of the Foreign Service application process for successful veteran applicants. A DD-214 is required to be considered for preference eligibility.
